

CHILDCARE

Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live, even though he dies; and whoever lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" "Yes, Lord," she told him, "I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, who was to come into the world." (John 11:25-27)

Childcare Employees in Great Demand: The childcare is hiring both full-time lead teachers with benefits and part-time assistant teachers up to 30 hours a week. If you know of

someone even able to work a partial day, that would helpful. Please have them contact the Childcare Director, Penny Swanson at swanson@trinitynet.org or 715-848-0166, ext. 348. Applicants must be at least 18 years of age. Getting more employees is the first thing we need to do in order to enroll more children, as we need to have the staff to care for the children first. We have an extensive waitlist of families that need care for their children. We continue to receive phone calls regularly from people needing childcare.

Center Closed: Monday, May 30th for Memorial Day.

ECC Registration: There is no school on Friday, May 6th for teacher in-service. Advanced registration is required for care. A 24-hour cancellation notice is required if care is no longer needed.

Summer ECC Registration: Summer registration forms are due to the childcare office by Monday, May 9th. This program starts on Tuesday, May 31st and runs through Tuesday, August 23rd. Looking forward to a wonderful, funfilled summer.

May Weekly Themes: Classroom weekly themes for this month are: flowers, Mother's Day, butterflies, chickens, community helpers, and pond. Watch for the children's creative artwork outside the classrooms.

Did you know...On March 31, 1983 approximately 400 adults and children gathered for the groundbreaking ceremony for a new parish center/school building. It was a cold morning with rain and snow that began with a large procession along Stewart Avenue and across the parking lot to the west side of the church. Construction work began on April 4th allowing the staff and children to finish out the school year in the old building. Considerable excitement was prompted by the discovery of a huge underground oil storage tank which no one remembered was there. By June 1, 1983 excavation for phase I was complete with footings poured, exterior walls beginning to rise and steel work being completed. With school soon to be out for the summer, construction would soon move into phase II which would require the demolition of the old school building. ...now you know!

OBSERVE NATURE AROUND YOU!

("Old Farmer's Almanac: 2022" by Robert B. Thomas)

Are worms and grubs reappearing? (The March Full Moon is called the "Worm Moon" for this very reason!)

Watch the arc of the sun across the sky as it shifts toward the north. Birds are migrating northward, along with the path of the sun.

Are you noticing that the days are getting longer? Did you know that the increasing sunlight inspires birds to sing? Cool, eh?

Are daffodils poking up their heads? Trees, shrubs, and flowers are sensitive to temperature and day length, too! Since ancient days, people have used natural events as indicators of when the weather is right for planting. For example: blooming crocuses are your cue to plant radishes, parsnips, and spinach.

Can you feel the sun getting stronger? The longer days bring high temperatures. Both we and the animals around us discard our warm clothes and heavy coats!

DO YOU KNOW

THE MEANING OR PURPOSE BEHIND THE MONTH OF MAY?

Originally, it was the name for the Roman goddess, Maia, who oversaw the growth of plants. It also came from the Latin word, "maiores," ("elders") who were celebrated during this month.

As with many holidays, May Day was rooted in agriculture. It celebrated springtime festivities filled with song and dancing celebrating that the sown fields were just starting to sprout and cattle were being driven to the pastures. The doors of houses as well as the cattle were decorated with yellow May flowers. In the Middle Ages, the festival, Beltane (meaning "Day of Fire") was celebrated with large bonfires and dancing at night.

When it eventually came to America, children would dance around the "May Pole" (a living tree chosen from the woods that was decorated with colorful ribbons) while holding onto the ribbons. The rites originally intended for the crops, livestock, and humans were celebrated, but gradually their significance was lost. May Day survived as a popular festival on May 1st with the May Pole. For younger couples, there was also the possibility of courtship. If a young man and woman were "paired" by sunset and their courtship succeeded...the marriage possibility would happen six weeks later in June—the result being the term "June Wedding," which became a tradition. Were you married in June?

Interestingly enough, the strict Puritans of New England considered the celebrations of May Day to be a pagan holiday, so its observance never became an important part of American culture as it was in Europe. From the late 19th century through the 1950s, the May Pole Dance and festivities became a rite of spring at some U.S. colleges. In the 1960s and 1970s, interest in these events weakened. The "May Queen" and her court became more of a popularity contest than a fun spring activity.

Now you know all about May Day! As colts and calves kick up their heels, seedlings seek the sun, and birds call for mates, we humans may join the revels for one day, during the spring's May Day festival!

July 28-31, 2022

The 26th Annual Trinity Family Camping Weekend will be held July 28-31, 2022.* Time goes fast, and at this point with the CoVID-19 pandemic, it is "time to dream" for good things and dreams in the near future. Once again, since so many campgrounds fill up faster these days than in years past, it is again important to get this information out to you. The camping weekend is an opportunity for great fellowship and the enjoyment of God's beautiful and warm creation with brothers and sisters in Christ. We are again going back to Farmer Gene's Campground near Marion, WI...about an hour drive from Wausau. Below is a Registration Form, which can also be found at the Reception Desk or in the Narthex.

Farmer Gene's Campground is a large campground with activities for family members of all ages. The address is N11301 Kenney Lake Road (Marion, WI 54950). The cost for the weekend stay (Friday through Sunday) and use of the facilities is \$90, and if you add Thursday, July 28th as an extra day (Thursday through Sunday), the cost will be \$130.50 for the four days. *Please Note: If you plan to camp the four-day period instead of the three-day weekend, it is important to let us know ASAP.

The planned activities are optional...campfires each evening, a spiritual growth study on Saturday morning, a potluck supper in the shelter at 5pm on Saturday (bring a dish to pass), and a worship service at 10am Sunday morning. (P.S. Good weather for the weekend has been requested.)

Facilities/Properties (update)

In process:

- THE SANCTUARY/NARTHEX/LOUNGE CARPET PROJECT IS FULLY FUNDED!! We have approved carpet selections for the Sanctuary, Stewart Ave entrance, Narthex, and Lounge. The carpet updates the spaces while respecting the rich history of Trinity. Any additional money marked "Carpet" will be moved into the Building Restoration fund. We have officially placed the order for the carpet, and we will be working to get this scheduled with all contractors as soon as possible. Look for an update here, in the Yellow Sheet, or in an announcement in church in upcoming weeks.
- We also have money to complete the interior restoration of the Sanctuary. The Properties Committee is hard at work to get quotes for this project so that the wall/ceiling restoration, wood floor refinishing, and carpet can all be completed at once. It is our duty and responsibility to maintain God's house, and thanks to the generous contributions of our congregation, we will be able to do just that. What a joy it is to complete this project, which will maintain our beautiful worship space for future generations!
- LEGACY DOLLARS HARD AT WORK! We are working with contractors to install a second set of security doors so that elevators and restrooms can be used when we hold church events without compromising the security in the school and childcare. This will be fully funded with Legacy Auction dollars that were raised in 2019 and 2021. We are hoping to complete this project this Summer as well.
- Finally, we have secured the funding to refurbish the Gym floors. Gym floors will be stripped down to the original wood, sanded, and repainted with the Trinity Athletics eagle logo in the center. The finished product will be stunning, and we are excited to show off the updated Gymnasium when it is completed before school starts in Fall 2022.

As you can see, we have been blessed to be able to complete some very big projects in the coming months. We ask for your prayers and your patience, as these projects will take a LOT of coordination, and they will be quite disruptive to the daily flow at Trinity. But once complete, we will have a facility that will serve generations to come in both the church and school.

March Financial Summary

March financials showed consistently generous offerings from members of the congregation. The chart includes 4 line items at the bottom that show the "bottom" line for each area within the church. We are all one budget, but we do have individual responsibilities for our respective areas. There is also a comparison to last year in the chart. Highlights from March financials include:

- Childcare update:
 - We continue to lose Childcare staffing due to normal turnover mixed with low wages, despite an increase in wages in September. Due to the challenges in staffing, we are operating at a lower capacity with respect to students. This is having a big negative impact on the bottom line.
 - Childcare is actually budgeted to lose about \$57,000/year, a dollar amount which is covered as a ministry of the church. We do not have the money to cover loss above and beyond that budgeted amount. If loss is projected above that budgeted amount, we need a plan of correction. We are in process of looking at this now.
 - We are currently projected to lose \$91,000 this fiscal year. That is \$34,000 loss *above* budget that we do not have as a contingency.
 - ♦ We don't have the cash flow to budget this kind of loss next year.
 - ♦ Childcare hosted the Carnival as an Outreach/fundraising event to help offset this loss.
- School is not expected to meet the income side of budget this year due to the loss of a few WPCP students. These students moved out
 of the area last summer, and others chose to attend a different school in the program. We are losing 2 more WPCP students this school
 year for various reasons.
- Tithes and Offerings are 16% under budget for March and 5% under budget for the year in the first nine months. There were significant dips in Tithes and Offerings in March. I cannot explain February, but March was budgeted rather high. I don't have notes for that. I thought I had budgeted Easter in the wrong month, but I also budgeted April high to account for Easter. We will have to watch this play out over the next couple of months.
- This is an unpredictable time of year for offerings, and I expect that to even out throughout the fiscal year.
- Keep in mind that Tithes and Offerings to the general fund are the main source of income. Along with tithes and offerings, childcare tuition (which is only about 55% of budget right now, and declining monthly), WPCP (which is down due to the aforementioned decreases) and school tuition all go to regularly budgeted salaries, benefits, supplies and operating costs (utilities, maintenance, cleaning supplies, etc.). As you can imagine, utilities and supply costs are increasing across the board as a result of inflation. Please pray that we are able to continue to take care of our staff while providing parishioners, students and missions with the resources and programs that enrich their lives.
- We continue to pay down debt ahead of schedule. Debt is currently:
 - ♦ Endowment Loan: \$105,852 ← Perspective...we borrowed \$212,000 from the Endowment in 2018 with the goal of paying it back in 15 years!
 - ♦ Thrivent Loan: \$581,637 ← Perspective...this was just under \$1,000,000 when I began at Trinity in August 2015!
 - TOTAL Debt: \$687,489 ← WOW! Last month this was \$702,164!

As we look ahead at the next budget year, Church Council (which includes representatives from School Board and Board of Elders) has asked that staff compensation be the focus in the upcoming budget cycle. While staff received a bonus in December 2020, most staff have not seen increases in over 2 years. The sacrifices that our staff members make to serve in a non-secular vocation should be met with the congregation's commitment to financially take care of them. There will be more on this in upcoming monthly articles.

We are trying to find ways to provide fruitful fellowship and get families connected within the church, school and childcare! Do you have a servant's heart and a love of people? Do you have great ideas of how Trinity can provide meaningful fellowship to different groups (or even just one group) of people? Please contact the Church Office at trinity@trinitynet.org and we will evaluate the fit! If you're interested in hosting, leading, planning or attending a group like this, let us know that too!

MAY CHALLENGE Is there someone you know who is no longer attending church since CoVID began in March 2020? Or maybe attending sporadically? Maybe you know a friend or neighbor who is looking for a more conservative church to visit or join? Your challenge for May is to invite someone to church...even if they are long standing members who you haven't seen in a while! This challenge helps us to love our neighbors and be the church!

Trinity is currently holding \$13,000 that was raised through a capital campaign a few years ago. This money is specifically raised for *inreach* and/or *outreach*. If you have an idea of how this money could best benefit Trinity or our community, please contact Bryon Graff <u>chair-man@trinitynet.org</u> so that he can help you get on the agenda to pitch your idea to the Church Council.

May God continue to work within you to continue to support the ministry at Trinity with time, talents and treasure...we are excited about gathering people to grow in faith, and we hope you are, too!
