



FROM THE PASTOR...

Grace, mercy and peace be to you from God our Father and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

He is Risen! He is Risen indeed! This month we are celebrating Easter, and this is the highpoint of the Christian year—the reason that we are all saved. Praise be to Christ and his victory over sin, Satan and the grave. Easter is the whole reason we are Christian, the whole reason we have eternal life, and the whole reason we come to church. As Paul says in 1 Corinthians 15—

Filthy. Dirty. Rat infested.

These are just a few of the

words used to describe a small village in Punjab. It consists of a grain market surrounded by a cluster of small houses. Desperately poor people live in these homes, since the area provides access to many day-labor jobs.

It's a tough place to be, but that just might be the exact reason God called one of our ministry partners to launch a Children's Bible Club there, led by a man named Sarampreet.

One of the children who signed up to attend was 11-year-old Shanay. In addition to the struggles faced by other villagers, Shanay dealt with a terrible home life, abused by his alcoholic father. This man didn't want his children to study, so he forced Shanay and his sister to go out begging instead—snatching any money they received as soon as they brought it home to buy more liquor.

It's hardly a surprise that Shanay often misbehaved when he first joined the Children's Bible Club—until the day he was quietly doing nothing with a somber look on his face. When Sarampreet asked what was wrong, Shanay tearfully poured out his heart to both Sarampreet and the other children there, explaining the pain his dad was causing.

While comforting Shanay, Sarampreet took this opportunity to talk about the love of Jesus Christ, who could heal his pain. He shared the Gospel, and then all the children at the Children's Bible Club joined in prayer for Shanay. Shanay started to pray, too—asking Jesus to transform his dad.

Miraculously, after being covered in prayer, Shanay's dad finally stopped his abusive, addictive behavior! The Holy Spirit remains at work in his life, and we invite you to join Shanay in prayer for his dad to ultimately surrender his heart to Christ.

Today, Shanay serves the Lord by bringing his friends to the Children's Bible Club and accompanying Sarampreet as he shares the Gospel around town. This brave young boy, strengthened by the love of Christ, is already making an incredible Kingdom impact, empowered by Jesus through the Bible Club you helped launch.

April Activities: Butterfly and Rainbow classrooms will go on a weekly walk if the April showers permit. Childcare chapel will be April 19th with Mr. Hoehne giving the message. 4-year-olds in the Butterfly classroom will visit the 4K classroom for Mrs. Graff to talk with them about 4K. Some of the classroom themes this month are: Easter, April Showers, Farm, Earth Day, Caterpillars, Butterflies, and Spring Colors.

Music: The Butterfly classroom worked on their singing skills and debuted their songs via a recording during some of the Sunday church services. I hope you enjoyed the special song they did for Palm Sunday.

The Origin of Easter

Do you know how our Easter holiday originated? Yes, sometimes historians point to Acts 12:4 (KJV)..."And when he (Herod) had apprehended him (Peter), he put him in prison, and delivered him to four quaternions (groups of four soldiers) to keep him; intending after Easter to bring him forth to the people." It is here translated from the Greek word "Pascha" and generally translated "Passover."

There is a weekly celebration, but there is no annual celebration of the resurrection of Christ recorded in the New Testament. The Jewish Christians linked it with the Passover and so observed it on the 14th day of Nisan (April) regardless of the day of the week. However, Gentile believers later celebrated the annual resurrection on the Lord's Day (Sunday).

In the year 325 at the Council of Nicea, it was decided that Easter would be observed on the First Sunday after the full moon following the vernal equinox (the time when the sun crosses the equator—approximately March 21st & September 22nd). This is still our method of determining the date of Easter. It will always fall between March 22nd and April 25th.

The name "Easter" comes from a pagan holiday which fell during that time of the year. It was a very joyful holiday with much brightness and tradition observed. From this, we get some of our traditions (Easter outfits, decorating of baskets, etc.).

But the important thing about Easter, Resurrection Sunday, is this: Are you really "in Christ"? Are you living daily for Jesus? If we say we believe, then we will show it by our "fruits" and lifestyle. This is not done by worshipping only on special holidays. Do we have room for improvement? I believe so!

P.S. Two suggestions...1) Continue to grow in your "faith walk" through your reading and study of the Bible, and 2) take time to share your faith walk with others, beginning with your own family and friends. God will bless you to be a blessing!

The 25th Annual Trinity Family Camping Weekend will be held July 23-25, 2021.* Time goes fast, and at this point with the CoVID-19 pandemic, it is "time to dream" for good things and dreams in the near future. Once again, since so many campgrounds fill up faster these days than in years past, it is again important to get this information out to you. The camping weekend is an opportunity for great fellowship and the enjoyment of God's beautiful and warm creation with brothers and sisters in Christ. The final update of information will be in the May Newsletter. We are again going back to Farmer Gene's Campground near Marion, WI...about an hour drive from Wausau. Below is a Registration Form, which can also be found at the Reception Desk or in the Narthex.

Farmer Gene's Campground is a large campground with activities for family members of all ages. The address is N11301 Kenney Lake Road (Marion, WI 54950). The cost for the weekend stay (Friday through Sunday) and use of the facilities is \$90, and if you add Thursday, July 22nd as an extra day (Thursday through Sunday), the cost will be \$130.50 for the four days. *Please Note: If you plan to camp the four-day period instead of the three-day weekend, it is important to let us know by Wednesday, April 14th. The planned activities are optional...campfires each evening, a spiritual growth study on Saturday morning, a potluck supper in the shelter at 5pm on Saturday (bring a dish to pass), and a worship service at 10am Sunday morning. (P.S. Good weather for the weekend has been requested.)

Facilities/Properties

In an effort to recover any credibility lost over the past few months over the Stewart Avenue steps project, we will refrain from saying that it will be completed by any specific time. Instead, we will say that manufacturing and weather delays have been a hindrance, but that we are confident that the finished project will have been worth the wait. The project is fully funded.

The Properties Committee, now a function of Church Council, met March 16 to evaluate major upcoming building priorities. Priorities/cost are as follows:

- 1. Ceiling/Wall Repair in the Sanctuary (balcony only)/ est. \$25,000 All areas of the ceiling and walls in the Sanctuary need repair. The damage has been mitigated with the new roof and insulation, so now we can focus on the peeling and cracks. The most critical area is over the balcony and would require removal and replacement of the organ pipes.
- 2. Brick/Molding Restoration on Stewart Avenue/ est. \$80,000 This project will include full restoration of mortar, brick, stone caps, as well as scraping, cleaning and painting of all wood surfaces for the entire front façade and 4 sides of both towers. We are also looking into casting the existing woodwork in a sustainable aluminum option. This estimate is based on a quote from 5 years ago, and we are in process of obtaining updated quotes. This is a true restoration effort, not patching small areas of concern. The idea would be to restore the brick and woodwork in a way that glorifies God's house and provides a solid exterior that protects the interior from water damage.
- **3. Remainder of the Sanctuary/ est. \$55,000** This project will require removal of pews and displacing church services for a period of 8-10 weeks, which will require extensive coordination efforts. Ideally, this will be coordinated with the next priority.
- **4. Carpet (Sanctuary, Narthex, Lounge)/** est. \$50,000 Ideally, we would do this to follow the Sanctuary ceiling/wall repair so that carpet could be installed before replacing the pews. Carpet will not be a focal point, and will be neutral in nature. We would also sand and refinish the hardwood under the pews at this time.

As you can see here, we are looking at a few major projects that will total over \$200,000. We would hope to complete these in the next two years if possible. If you feel passionate about facility updates, you can give to "Building Restoration," which will help fund these upcoming projects in this order.

We continue to carry out disinfection protocols every day after school and church to insure the safety of our staff, students and visitors. Extra measures have also been implemented in childcare. We are using non-toxic cleaning materials when possible to reduce exposure to potentially harmful chemicals. All cleaning materials that we are using have been researched and are on record with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to kill human coronavirus according to Center for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines.

February Financial Summary February financials are reflective of what we expected to see:

- We continue to struggle to fill vacancies in Childcare due to CoVID, which is impacting the Childcare Net Income by about \$30,000 to date (projected to have a \$45,000 unbudgeted loss by the end of the fiscal year). Childcare income is at 51% of budget for the year, while expenses are much higher at 71% of budget for the year. This is a big financial impact, which is causing us to look at solutions that need to be in process sooner than later. We have space for more children, but have an equal struggle in filling open positions...there is an important balance of these struggles that we hope to achieve.
- We are falling 5% short of budget for tithes and offerings. With less people attending church, we are seeing a dip in tithes and offerings that will likely impact our operating budget next fiscal year, meaning that we expect to have less funds to allocate to the overall ministry and must be able to account for that in spending. In general, Easter tends to give us a better picture of how the financials will look when the fiscal year ends in June. I'm not sounding alarms at this time.
- We are well under budget for expenses overall...we continue to be good stewards of the resources we are given. We continue to pay down debt ahead of schedule. Debt is currently:

-Endowment Loan: \$144,233 -Thrivent Loan: \$641,049 -TOTAL Debt: \$785,282

In contrast to the report in December, our financial outlook for this financial year is not great...but it is not horrible either. We continue to be good stewards, but CoVID-19 is impacting our operations in more ways than we imagined. The future feels uncertain in the current political climate, but we are faithful that God's plan will be for Trinity to continue ministry for generations to come. We are truly blessed beyond measure.

PPP Loan Update (in case you've missed this over the last couple of months):

In April of 2020, we applied for and received a Payroll Protection Program loan from the Small Business Association in the amount of \$227,600. The purpose of that "forgivable" loan was to provide relief during the Stay-At-Home period, when continued income was unpredictable. Because of the loan, we were able to continue providing income and benefits for all of our staff during that 8-week period.


We were able to apply for loan forgiveness in September. The SBA had 90 days to review our application and determine if any of our loan could be forgiven. We are so blessed! We found out in early November that 100% of our PPP Loan was forgiven, which means that we don't have to pay any of it back! Some of that money is covering the loss that we are experiencing in childcare as a result of families staying home due to lost jobs, working from home, etc. Some of the money has been spent on salaries and benefits that fell outside of the 8-week eligible expense period. Some of that money went to staff bonuses in December since we were unable to budget wage increases this year. We are in process of evaluating what portion of that money remains and how it is best served in ministry.

Praise God from whom all blessings flow!

Did you know...As the surrounding area around Wausau continued to grow there was a transportation need for some students to get to school. In 1965 a Volkswagen van was purchased to transport sixty-eight students to and from school on a trial basis. When public transportation was made available to parochial school students only students within two miles of Trinity were offered transportation. In 1970, a new fifteen passenger Dodge Maxiwagon was purchased and the VW van was sold. In 1979, when state codes required extensive alterations of the Dodge, the congregation purchased a 29-passenger International half bus. Drivers for the school over the years were teachers John Kupsky and Margaret Born, DCE Paul Schwarting, and Bobby Moser, Ed Hannemann, Mrs. Doede, Sandra Wimmer, and finally Elvera Neumann. ...now you know!

Did you know...Trinity listed 46 young men from its midst in the military service during World War I, and those dying for their country, falling in action or becoming the victims of the deadly influenza at the time were: Reinhold Prochnow, Walter Raduechel, Arthur Radant and Edward Sell. In 1943, there were 170 members of Trinity serving in the Armed Forces, with 44 in service overseas. To help them keep in touch with our congregation and each other, an elaborate news system, called "The Mail Bag", under the direction of Pastor Martin A. Bertermann, was introduced.

Trinity would eventually have 222 members serving in the military during World War II. Ten members died in action: Merlin Graveen, Jerome Knorr, Donald Hildebrandt, Martin Kankelfitz, Lawrence Erdman, Harold Sperberg, Elroy Woller, Merlin Gahnz, William Block and Rodney Schubring. As was common practice in the churches, Trinity Placed an American flag and

Christian flag in the chancel area in April, 1942. ...now you know!
